What is TfT?

Teaching for Transformation is a design framework for the creation of authentic, formational learning experiences rooted in a transformational worldview. These learning experiences invite, nurture, and empower teachers and students to play their part in God's Story through their everyday learning.

The core practices of Teaching for Transformation are practiced in over 100 schools worldwide to create learning experiences that empower teachers and students to explore their role in the kingdom story. Allendale Christian School is pleased to be a member of the TfT network of Christian schools. We joined this movement in 2018.



Deep Hope

We are people of hope. Not wishes or plans. And, more than just hope. Deep hope.

Deep hope represents why we followed the call to become teachers at Allendale Christian School. It aligns with the desires that you, as parents, have when you enroll your children in our school.

And, within Teaching for Transformation, it is the first question we ask ourselves when we design learning experiences for our students: "What is our deep hope?"

It is our North Star that guides us on our learning journey at ACS.














Storyline

Within Teaching for Transformation's framework, the learning of every classroom is rooted in a compelling vision of the kingdom. The fundamental purpose of the core practice storyline is to connect the learning and the learners to God's story. Using language and imagery that connects both to the curriculum and the kingdom story, storyline ensures learners **see the story** that invites them to be a part of how God is making all things new. A Teaching for Transformation classroom displays artifacts and evidence of students connecting their learning to God's story of renewal.





Formational Learning Experiences

Once teachers and students are invited to see the story, a Teaching for Transformation classroom provides opportunities for learners to **live the story**. Formational Learning Experiences (FLEx) are opportunities for the learner to engage in "real work that meets a real need for real people"—opportunities to practice living the kingdom story. Students from preschool through 8th grade are given the opportunity to respond to God's call to be active, restorative, and creative in God's story of redeeming

love. It is through the practice of engaging in meaningful school work, school work that is kingdom work, that the learner is forming a compelling vision and desire for living within God's story. As engagement and motivation increase, so does a student's mastery of curricular content.





Habits of Living

At ACS, Formational Learning Experiences push beyond mastery of curriculum. They form habits of living and shape who we are. Habits of Living are discipleship habits and practices that both form the learners and transform God's world around them. Habits of Living help students, teachers, and parents imagine what it means to be a disciple within God's story. They articulate a vision for how their school's graduates will live.

So, as the learners are provided opportunities to engage in "real work that meets real needs for real people," they are given direction in **how to engage**—as God worshipers, justice seekers, beauty creators, for example. The practice of Habits of Living shapes the learning and sparks a desire within the learners to actively play their role in the formation of culture. Habits of Living ensure the focus is not just about what the learner should know; they propel us to educate for who the learner is called to be within God's story.



Habits of Living

At ACS, we call these Habits of Living.




God Worshipers Those who see their lives as acts of worship. Worshiping God is being in awe and wonder of Him and His promises.

Community Builders Those who live out the truth that God created us in community. They show grace and work together in peace.

Servant Workers Those who work actively to heal brokenness and bring joy to individuals and society.

Justice Seekers Those who advocate for change on behalf of other image bearers by identifying and responding to injustices.

Earth Keepers Those who respond to God's call to be stewards of God's creation.



Beauty Creators Those who celebrate God's creation by enjoying and creating beautiful things as a way of worshiping Him.

Image Reflectors Those who understand what it means to be made in God's image, and recognize that in themselves and others.

Loving Communicators Those who clearly communicate with love and kindness while interacting with others.

Idolatry Discerners Those who understand that we create idols when other priorities become more important than our relationship with God.

Creation Enjoyers Those who actively seek God and discover joy in His creation, and appreciate what He has given us.

Order Discovers Those who recognize that God's fingerprints are on everything He creates, and that He brings order to creation.
